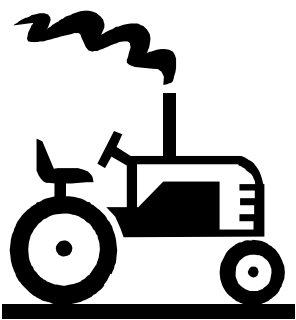


UTAH AGRICULTURE

ORGANIC FARMING

The Utah Department of Agriculture & Food is returning to the basics with implementation of a new organic certification program. UDAF partners with the (IOIA) Independent Organic Inspectors Association and growers to establish a set of standards applicable to Utah and compatible with Federal and Industry standards. The program will provide accessible, accurate timely certification services at a reasonable fee to cover program costs.



Utah ranks 35th out of 50 states in the nation in total number of farms with 12 million acres in agricultural production. The state is also 26th in the amount of land in farms. The table below shows the national rankings for various commodities.

Agriculture & the Economy

Agriculture remains a consistent economic producer for the state of Utah. Farmers and ranchers generate more than \$1 billion a year in raw products. By the time those crops reach our dinner tables, they've added approximately \$3 billion to the state's economy. More than 100,000 people in Utah employed by agriculture and agribusiness.



Global marketing of products of Utah continues to grow. You may see Utah dairy, poultry, fruit, and livestock products for sale around the world. Products on shelves of foreign countries are

wheat, alfalfa, livestock dairy, and poultry.

Farm Credit Mediation

Utah Participates in a voluntary mediation program. Mediation is a process used to solve problems and settle disputed issues related to farm credit, debt restructure and voluntary liquidation of farm property. The state provides a neutral third party for borrower and lender discussions in order to facilitate discussion and generate alternative plans. All decisions are made by the borrowers and lenders. All parties come to mediation with the understanding they will seek a mutually agreeable solution that, in the best way possible, meets the needs of all parties. Ag In the Classroom

The Utah Foundation for Agriculture in the Classroom (AITC) is a cooperative program of the Utah Department of Agriculture & Food and Utah State University. The program is designed to help students develop an awareness and understanding of our food and fiber system, and how agriculture impacts our lives. AITC provides teachers with training and resources to use agriculture as a vehicle to teach across existing curriculum by enhancing the subjects teachers already teach.
