Northern Area:

Central Area:

Premium: 5,350 tons Premium to Supreme big bale alfalfa hay \$270 to \$280 fob barns, minimal rain damage on only a few stacks, current to extended move; 650 tons non-rained on Premium alfalfa hay \$268 fob barn. 1,600 tons big bale 3-way grain hay \$130 fob barn, some staying local.

Good: 4,850 tons export alfalfa hay \$220 straight through fob barn.
