Blue Grama Grass (Bouteloua gracilis)







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Zone: 3-8

Color: Green to yellow

Bloom Time: Mid to late summer

Plant Type: Perennial grass

Mature Height: 6-24" tall

Mature Spread: 1' wide

Water Use: Low water

Soil Type: Sand to loam to heavy clay

Range and Native Habitat: Blue grama grass is native to most states in the United States and occurs in hot, dry habitats such as upland prairies, plains, and open rocky woodlands below 7,000 feet. It is a dominant grass in dry, shortgrass prairies.

Suggested Maintenance: Delay removing old growth until early spring to allow for winter interest and to provide shelter for various types of wildlife during the colder months. Maintain grasses with infrequent mowing (monthly to 2x a year).

Other: Blue grama grass is also called "eyelash grass." It is the state grass of Colorado and New Mexico. The grass supports 13 species of butterfly larvae and provides forage for wild turkey, sparrows, and wrens. It is often used as an alternative, low maintenance lawn and in park strip plantings.
