Wild Hollyhock (*Iliamna rivularis*)





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
Zone: 3-8 Color: White, pink, purple Bloom Time: June through August Plant Type: Perennial herb Mature Height: 2-6' tall Mature Spread: 2-3' wide Water Use: Medium

Soil Type: Chalk, clay, loam, and sand

Range and Native Habitat: Wild hollyhock grows throughout western U.S. with the exception of California, Arizona, and New Mexico. It grows in moist soils in open forests, meadows, and disturbed areas between 7,000 and 11,000 feet in elevation.

Suggested Maintenance: Wild hollyhock requires moist, well-drained soils. It should be placed in an area with ample space and along the backside of the garden bed, as the plant can become bushy and tall.

Other: The species name, *rivularis*, refers to the plant's preference for stream banks. The seeds need a heat treatment, such as full sun, and/or scarification to germinate. Wild hollyhock readily establishes after a wild-fire but can be quickly overtaken by other vegetation.
