



UTAH POLLINATOR HABITAT PROGRAM

Tufted Evening Primrose (*Oenothera caespitosa*)



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Zone: 4-9

Color: White fading to shades of pink/purple

Bloom Time: March through August

Plant Type: Biennial herb

Mature Height: 8"-1' tall

Mature Spread: 1-2' wide

Water Use: Low

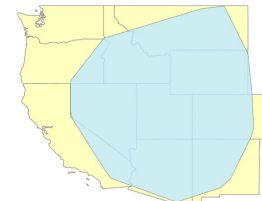
Soil Type: Fast-draining sandy or rocky soils

Range and Native Habitat: Tufted evening primrose occurs throughout the western U.S. with the exception of the coastal portion of the U.S. It prefers talus slopes, sandy plains, dry buttes, exposed hillsides, and open woods.

Suggested Maintenance: This species requires little maintenance. If propagating, it is best grown from seed. Root division is possible but less successful. Few diseases or insects affect the plant. Supplemental summer irrigation will extend the bloom season.

Other: The tufted evening primrose flowers open in late afternoon and close in the morning. The plant spreads by lateral roots. It is a biennial but can live longer if provided adequate drainage and at least 1/2 day of full sun. The plant should be allowed to dry out between watering.
